

2025 Point In Time Methods


The 2025 Point In Time survey was conducted from 10:00 pm on January 27, 2025 through January 28, 2025. Both sheltered and unsheltered counts were conducted. Below are the methods used for each. The CoC Governing Board approved these methods on 1/10/25.

Sheltered Count

The HMIS Lead consulted with each of the TH, ES, PSH, and RRH programs to ensure completeness and accuracy of their data for the PIT survey. The Women's Center provided data from their comparable database for their emergency shelter count and for the Safely Home RRH program.

Unsheltered Count

Continuum of Care partners were notified of the survey at the 11/14/24, the 12/12/24, and the 1/9/25 Housing & Homeless Coalition meetings. 12 outreach teams and 6 drop-in sites were in operation.



A flyer was created with a QR code to access the survey. Signs were hung just before the survey so that households in need were not misled to wait for the survey to access assistance.

All surveyors were required to attend a mandatory training and to complete a quiz to demonstrate understanding of the definition of homelessness, familiarity with the survey and the mobile app, outreach strategies, and safety protocols.

Letters were sent ahead of the survey to all of the Police Chiefs in the County asking for their participation. The County 911 Center also sent a reminder the day of the survey to all first responders. 2 police departments contacted the CoC Coordinator with updates about homelessness in their jurisdictions. Outreach teams also contacted the police in the areas they covered.

12 outreach teams canvassed the County visiting known homeless sites as well as sites where homeless people tend to spend time. A new approach this year included some teams canvassing from 10 pm to 12 am and others canvassing in the early morning hours or later in the day depending on the areas they were covering. Also 6 specific sites were visited to conduct surveys on anyone who may present as homeless including soup kitchens, a drop-in center, and libraries. Also, the Salvation Army loaned their mobile canteen to the survey effort. They visited two locations – one in Beaver Falls and one in Aliquippa.

Youth strategies: The AIU blasted PIT information to all of the school districts. The CoC Coordinator also engaged the Head Start/Early Head Start program in the PIT survey. HS/EHS staff attended the training. There was a YAP representative on the planning committee bringing insight to finding homeless youth as well as youth contacts. We scheduled youth to prepare the outreach bags but due to inclement weather that day school was cancelled and the youth were not available to help. We also attempted to utilize the schools to gather items for the outreach bags but the timing of the effort was misaligned due to the holiday. This is something that will be considered in the 2026 planning effort.

Veteran strategies: 2 agencies that serve Veterans participated in planning the PIT survey. And 3 veteran agencies conducted outreach. 1 veteran conducted outreach.

Homeless input: The Lived Experience Homeless committee provided insight on sites to look for homeless people as well as relevant items to include in the outreach bags. Six formerly homeless people signed up to help conduct outreach and complete surveys but were unexpectedly unavailable on the day of the survey.

Suggestions for next year:

- Get totes for the outreach bags
- Let outreach teams pick their times
- Place notes/signage on the backpacks
- Dry shampoo

- Start a fund
- Make an Amazon wish list
- Get soap tablet cloths
- Include blankets

- Light/phone charger
- Remove razors
- Free hair cut coupons
- Include tarps



State Investment in Homelessness Prevention

The Housing Alliance of Pennsylvania seeks to create a state funding resource for preventing homelessness by resolving eviction filing complaints between tenants and landlords when tenants are behind on paying rent. We seek to incorporate best practices in housing stabilization to benefit the housing stability of tenants and the business needs of landlords.

The goal is to reduce the likelihood of at-risk tenants ever coming into contact with the homelessness service system¹ by expanding programs that assist both landlords and tenants to resolve disputes due to non-payment of rent. The proposed program would include landlord tenant dispute interventions, resource navigation, and direct assistance.

Statement of Need

310 eviction filings occur every day in Pennsylvania². In cases where tenants are behind in paying their rent, resolving the conflict outside of court and without an eviction can benefit both the tenant and landlord.

Most landlords are not large corporations but are individuals, often referred to as "mom-and-pop" landlords. Industry research shows that over 70% of rental properties and 40% of all rental units are owned by mom-and-pops³, with 30% considered low-to moderate income themselves⁴, and during the pandemic their tenants struggled more to pay their rent⁵.

In 2023, a Housing Alliance survey of 660 PA landlords found that two-thirds of small landlords with less than 20 units are struggling to meet their financial obligations.⁶ An eviction can be detrimental to a small landlord, ranging in cost anywhere from \$3,500 to \$10,000 per eviction. This includes the past due rent, and attorney and court fees on top of the expense to prepare the unit to be rented again. Even when a landlord is awarded a money judgement during the eviction court process, research shows there is only a 17% chance on successfully collecting the debt⁷.

The pandemic-era resources helped communities to focus on homeless prevention by intervening at the onset of landlord tenant disputes or during the eviction process. There are a number of successful eviction prevention programs in Pennsylvania that have produced strong outcomes in resolving the dispute resulting from non-payment of rent.

State Investment in Homelessness Prevention

Proposed Program Structure

We seek to create a homeless prevention program that will help maintain programs currently in place and support duplication of effective program strategies in other communities.

This program will create a comprehensive set of resources to help low-income renter households that are at risk of eviction and/or utility shut-off. Each program will contain three core components:

- 1. Landlord-tenant dispute interventions to facilitate communication and negotiation with landlord-tenant mediation and/or access to legal counsel.
- 2. Resource navigation to address underlying issues to promote stable tenancy going forward.
- 3. Direct assistance to satisfy the rent debt, addressing the unmet business need of the landlord.

Eligibility

Tenants must be income eligible at 50% AMI or below and at imminent risk of eviction and/or utility shut-off. Self-attestation and categorical eligibility can be used when determining eligibility.

Eligible uses of funds

Communities would be encouraged to obtain multiple funding sources. It is possible for funding to only be applied towards one component of the program as long as other components are present. This is intended to encourage the leveraging of other resources.

Rental and Utility Assistance- up to \$5000 emergency assistance towards rental or utility arrears or housing relocation if needed.

Resource Navigation – a quick connection and warm hand-off to voluntary services and resources to mitigate underlying cause of housing instability.

Court Coordination – a necessary component of any court-connected eviction prevention programming, this allows for additional supports to ensure timely communication between courts, tenants, and landlords to facilitate court process efficiencies, outreach, program intakes and connections to resource partners.

Legal Services – This includes creating partnerships with local bar associations and pro bono programs, paying attorneys as independent contractors, or creating a position on staff to hire a licensed attorney in Pennsylvania to provide necessary legal advice and/or legal representation.

Landlord Tenant Mediation Services – This includes paying formally trained mediators as independent contractors or creating a position on staff to provide mediations. Those providing

mediation services at minimum should have completed a basic mediation training which includes, dispute resolution information, theory, philosophy, differing models, skill building, and role play and adherence to the national Model Standards of Conduct for Mediators.

Intensive Outreach – This includes direct outreach to both landlords and tenants active in the eviction process. This also includes any costs that may be associated with facilitating information sharing between court staff and service providers in court-connected eviction prevention programs.

Landlord Engagement – This can include pre-filing education and information sharing to help landlords become familiar with resources available in their area to serve as an alternative to immediately filing an eviction.

Payment recipients

Payments should primarily be paid directly to either landlord or utility. However, in the event that the entity is not willing to participate in the program then payment should be made directly to the tenant with expectation and attestation they will pay debt immediately.

Administrative Costs

We recommend administrative costs be set at a minimum of 15% to ensure adequate resources are available and aligned to ensure timely delivery of high-quality services.

Funding Allocation

The Housing Alliance recommends a competitive grant process over formula allocation. The benefits of a competitive process are:

- Communities with a strong interest will have an opportunity to receive an amount of funding versus a formula allocation.
- Communities that apply will adopt and maintain a high fidelity to best practices in administering eviction prevention programs learned from the federal emergency rental assistance program.

- Income at or below 30% AMI
- Eligible for the Housing Authority




